A NEW BEGINNING FOR SURVIVORS

Emergency Residential Shelter Renovations

In late fall of 2023, Turning Point proudly completed crucial renovations to its Emergency Residential Shelter, made possible through the generous support of a City of Columbus Block Grant. These renovations have transformed the facility, allowing Turning Point to better serve survivors and their families experiencing homelessness as a result of violence. With these upgrades, the shelter has expanded from a 25 to 40-bed facility, significantly increasing capacity to offer safe and supportive housing to those in need in times of crisis. The renovation came at a critical time, as the agency continued to see an uptick in lethality and homelessness.

The enhancements to the Emergency Shelter included the addition of new sleeping rooms for program participants. Dedicated spaces were specifically designed for special populations, ensuring that everyone who seeks refuge at Turning Point can find a space that meets their unique needs. The agency's commitment to accessibility has also been a key focus, with the renovations making the shelter more ADA-friendly and inclusive for all individuals.

These improvements were made possible following the agency's strategic move to its new administrative offices, now named The Landmark. This allowed for the relocation of the Shelter Case Managers' offices to The Landmark as well, which has encouraged overall streamlining of services. By doing so, essential space was freed up within the shelter itself, to allow the creation of more sleeping rooms, and to better accommodate program participants. This proximity ensures that case managers remain accessible and connected to program participants, fostering a supportive and cohesive environment.

At Turning Point, we are dedicated to providing a safe haven and a fresh start for survivors of intimate partner violence. The recent renovations mark a significant milestone in our ongoing mission to offer help, hope, safety, and support to those who need it most. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the City of Columbus for their crucial support of this project, as together we make a profound impact on the lives of survivors every day.

PREVENTION: BUILDING



Turning Point continued to reinvigorate the Prevention Program with exciting initiatives aimed at fostering healthy relationships and promoting positive family interactions throughout the year. One of our standout programs, Date Night, has become a hit among local teens. These fun and free events offer a safe and enjoyable way for teens to spend time together, whether it's a first date, a night out with friends, or a group outing with their sports team. The primary goal is to engage students in healthy relationship behaviors while they enjoy a memorable night out. All middle and high school students are welcome, ensuring inclusivity and broad community engagement.

The Prevention Team also saw a significant boost in Family Game Night events throughout the year. These activities, free and open to the community, are designed to promote positive family interactions and quality time. By focusing on the 40 Developmental Assets, Family Game Nights help children and



youth develop critical life skills. These events foster healthy relationships within families by promoting positive communication, resilience, and social competencies. The joy and connections shared during game nights strengthen family bonds and create lasting memories. Family Game Nights are primarily hosted on the Prevention Floor of The Landmark and were made possible by the generosity of Cummins, Inc. in 2023.

HOPE FOR TOMORROW

The Prevention Team also continued its impactful work throughout the community, maintaining a strong presence at various locations, including the Columbus Behavioral Center and Youth Services, while beginning collaborations with partners such as the Indiana Youth Group and Boys and Girls Clubs.

At the Emergency Shelter, the team held weekly children's and intergenerational groups utilizing art to help children and families cope with trauma. These sessions are invaluable in providing emotional support and encouraging healing through creative expression.



The Prevention Team remained active in local middle and high school classrooms, educating teens about healthy relationships. These classroom sessions remain crucial in equipping young people with the knowledge and skills to build respectful and supportive relationships.

Excitingly, Turning Point has also become a satellite location for the Bartholomew County Public Library. This new addition allows teens to check out books during their visits for events and programs, promoting literacy and learning alongside other programming initiatives.

Through these comprehensive efforts, Turning Point's Prevention Program is making a meaningful impact on the lives of individuals and families in




work together to promote safety, wellness, and resilience.
